

When I read Kent's insert in the LHS Newsletter about our President giving the new NASA Administrator Charles Bolden the charge of "Boosting Self Esteem in the Muslim World", I was shocked. So I Googled the subject and it's sited in at least 4 web sites. The best description is in the online British site, telegraph.co.uk, which is a sister publication of the Sunday Telegraph.

They quote an interview with Bolden where he says the President wanted the agency to "reinspire children to get into science and math, expand our international relationships, and reach out to the Muslim world and .....help them feel good about their historic contributions to science..."

I concluded that the President really did say this and the only widely read news site that reported it was Fox News.

The NASA I knew and worked for was much different.

The manned space program (Shuttle and Space Station) were the most publicized and soaked up the most \$. NASA also launched a lot of other satellites for scientific purposes and for observing the earth. They admitted 35 years ago that the earth couldn't be observed from the Space Station or the Shuttle. The problem is that all waste water and material thrown out buy the astronauts would collect on telescope lenses and mirrors in the absence of gravity.

So NASA launched the Earth Observing System which used automated instruments which could be directed from scientists on the ground similar to the Mars Rovers. They also developed most of the communication satellites.

NASA's mission used to be to explore and develop the use of space, and to develop Aeronautics (the A in its name). The sad truth we all knew is that the Shuttle Space Station program produced very little science and soaked up most of their \$ and had huge technical problems in its design so it never became the "Columbus exploration of Space" they hoped it would be.

Automatic instruments and robots did a far better job of observing the earth, Venus and Mars, but the news media seldom gave them any attention. Without astronauts, there is little drama.

We used to say "What is the Purpose of the Space Station?" - Answer "To have place for the shuttle to go to?" and visa versa. Which turned out to be true in the shuttle's last years because NASA was afraid of another Shuttle being crippled in launch and not being able to return as what happened to Columbia.

The cost of now using Russian vehicles, \$70-100 million/seat, turns out to be cheaper than our shuttles which blew >1/2 billion \$ per launch. The manned space program's biggest accomplishment was repairing the Hubble Telescope but future repairs are dangerous because its orbit is different from the Space Station and if another shuttle gets damaged on launch, it won't have a refuge.

Science is still be done by NASA, although the part that gets the most attention is the global warming press releases. I'm hoping that NASA retains its science exploration programs. Obama isn't the first president to throw NASA a distraction. Bush wanted NASA to send astronauts to Mars. Those robotic Mars Rovers are doing a great job right now and the astronaut program just took funding away from the science programs. NASA survived that one.
