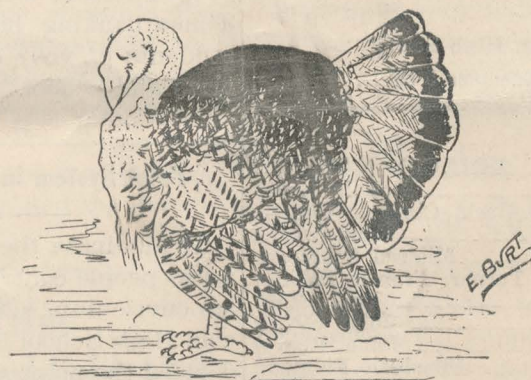

Rapids Defeats

Antigo 12-0

Coach Shafer's Rapids High School football team defeated the supposedly weak Antigo team in a game in which the Shafermen were far from their regular form. On the other hand, the team from the northern city played their best game of the season. Had the Rapids hit the same stride they did at Nekoosa last week, the score might have been doubled.

Antigo started with a bang and marched straight to the goal, at one time a plunge by fullback, Collins, crossed the goal but was called back by the referee as Antigo was offside. This was the only time that Antigo threatened to score and from that time on they were held in the middle of the field.

The Rapids' first score came when the flashy halfback, Klappa, intercepted a pass on the 33-yard line and raced over the goal. Turner's attempted drop kick was blocked. In the fourth quarter, Turner, Rapids end, broke loose and caught a beautiful pass from Panter. Turner took it on a dead run and ran 20 yards, easily distancing the Antigo quarterback, or a touchdown which seemed to please the crowd a great deal.

There were no individual stars during the game but the Rapids guards, Searles and Garber played whirlwind games, stopping the plunging Antigo backs time after time.

First Quarter

The first quarter started as Antigo kicked off to Herron who carried the ball to the Rapids 30 yard line, and on exchange punts the ball came in the Rapids' possession on the 20-yard line. The first quarter was even, as the play was in the middle of the field most of the time.

Second Quarter

In the second quarter Antigo went straight down the field with an attack climaxed by Dodge's 18-yard run. On a series of plays the ball was brought to the 9-yard line and a plunge by Collins took it over but it was brought back as Antigo was offside.

The Rapids team then gained possession of the ball and punted out of danger.

Third Quarter

The tide turned a few minutes

after the half, when Klappa intercepted a pass and ran 33-yards for a touchdown. The Rapids gained constantly there after and seemed to be hitting their stride.

Fourth Quarter

On an exchange of punts the Rapids gained possession of the ball on the 40-yard line and a pass, Panter to Turner, scored the second touchdown. The Rapids threatened to score the remainder of the period but lacked the punch to put it over.

Freshmen Trim Marshfield 12-0

The freshmen of Lincoln High easily defeated the Marshfield freshman in a fast game featured by the long runs of Omholt and Mackaben. Although all of "Tory's" team played exceptionally well, Omholt and Mackaben were the outstanding stars of the game. Stellmacher, stocky center for the Rapids, played a fine game in the line.

The first quarter started when Marshfield kicked off to the Rapids, on a series of plays, the Rapids brought the ball to the 35 yard line and on the next play Mackaben broke loose for a pretty run to score. Omholt missed the kick. The quarter ended in Rapids favor 6-0.

The second quarter was more evenly matched, and the play was in the center of the field most of the time.

The third quarter was again in the Rapids favor. Line bucks by Henke and runs by Omholt brought the ball to the 10 yard line and on a fake play Omholt took it across. Again the goal kick was missed. The game ended with the score 12 to 0.

STAN KLAPPA

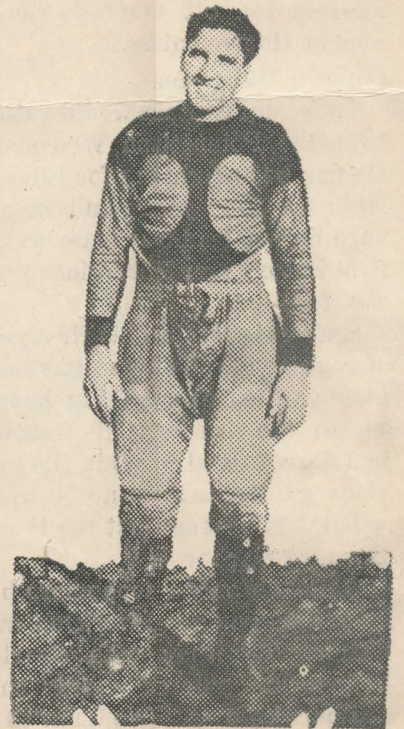
"Although the Point beat us last year, that is no sign that they are going to beat us this year. I know that the team will give all they have to beat the Pointers."
