

While awaiting announcements of the awards an attractive program of solo-ensemble talent from lead ing school musicians from all over Wisconsin will be given, and there will be bands to give special short concerts. The Wisconsin Rapids High School band and the Waupun High School band will unite to form a hundred and sixty piece band to give a Sousa Memorial program. The students of all the respective schools will be arranged in the field house, in sections grouped to permit for organized cheering. both for the announcement of rewards and for unusual stunts which will be a point of this unique program

It is the plan of the association, according to Mr. H. C. Wegner. the efficient and tireless secreta ry of the W. S. B. A. to arrange for three simultaneous programs during the tournament so that all competitions will be held before the grand parade and the marching events on Saturday afternoon.

On Friday evening various organizations of the city, the Elks, the Eagles and the Band Moth er's will sponsor dances for the entertainment of the students.

If the coming tournament at Wisconsin Rapids is not a great success in every respect it will not be because the general committee in charge, and the people of the city have not done every thing in their power to make it the greatest event in the history of the Wisconsin School Band and Orchestra Association.
