In this issue of Lincoln Lights we have chosen for the "Meet the Coaches" series, that coach whom we all know and like--J. A. Torressani, most commonly called "Tory."

Tory was born on July 31, 1901 and it is said that the stork didn't carry him, he carried the stork. Right then and there, Tory decided his future--Athletics.

When Tory was a wee tot he started to attend the McKinley-Elba grade school somewhere in Minnesota. When Tory graduated he went to Gilbert High School in Minnesota, and it is here he started his athletic career. Tory went out for football, basketball and track. Tory was halfback on the football team and forward in basketball. In track Tory earned a name for himself. He won the State Championship for the 100 and 220 yard dash. He was and still is considered the fastest man ever to attend the Gilbert High School. While in high school Tory earned letters for all the things he went out for.

After his high school education Tory chose LaCrosse State Teachers College for his advance education. At LaCrosse he went out for football and track, played halfback and was a sprinter. He earned his letters in college.

Tory came here in the fall of 1924 and is now director of physical education, coach of hockey, track, and freshman football.
