WISCONSIN RAPIDS CAPTURES POINT REGIONAL TOURNAMENT

DEFEAT MOSINEE IN **REGIONAL FINALS 41-34**

The Red Raiders won the regional tournament at Stevens Point Saturday night March 2 by defeating Mosinee 41-34 in the finals.

Wisconsin Rapids easily defeated Waupaca in the first round, 66-24. Bob Mader again starred for the local boys as he collected 22 points. The second team played a good share of the game.

Friday, the Red Raiders tripped their arch rival, Stevens Point, 36-32. Wittrock, with the help of his teammates, bottled up Jim Moore quite effectively, limiting the giant center to 13 points. Bill Passineau sank five baskets and one free throw to lead the Rapids' scoring. After getting off to a fast start, Mander's aggregation successfully upheld their lead. They stalled most of the fourth quarter and raised a great deal of protest from the Point fans.

In Saturday night's tussle a tired determined team pulled and through to victory. John Ritchay was high point man for the Rapids with 11 points.

Lincoln Lights is again being printed this year at the Witter building after a lapse of two years. The linotype machine which has been idle for two years, has been causing us undue trouble. The fact that machines deteriorate without use has certainly been proven to the Lincoln Lights staff. Mr. Whydotski, the printing instructor, has spent a good part of his time fixing this machine. After one defect was corrected, something else would break. Besides the time put in by Mr. Whydotski on the machine, a mechanic from the Tribune has been called in several times. At times even the Trib mechanic was baffled by the exploits of the linotype.

Most of the work has had to be done by the printing teacher, since there were no experienced printing students. Mr. Whydotski has been breaking in new students to alleviate the extra burden.

In the previous issues many mistakes were made. Most of these were made by the aforementioned trouble maker. Since Mr. Whydotski couldn't do three, four, or five things at once, much time was necessary to print the paper. Rather than delay the issuing date further to correct the mistakes, we have passed by them.

The hopes for a better printed Lincoln Lights of the future are brighter. The linotype machine has been put back into use and should cause little more trouble. A staff of linotype operators and pressmen will have been organized. This will lessen the pinch of time. As you have probably noticed, the number of errors in the Lincoln Lights has been decreasing. Our goal for this year is to eliminate them completely.
