Rapids Loses In 2nd Tilt

The Red Raiders ended their excellent season this year by losing an overtime battle to a surprise Reedsville state champion team, 47 to 43 on the second night of the tournament at Madison. The game was played before about 12,000 praying and cheering fans at the University fieldhouse.

Bob Mader scored 21 points to lead both teams in scoring and he also did the seemingly impossible when, with two seconds left in the game, he dropped in a rebound to tie the score and throw the game into an overtime period.

Rapids Triumphs

Wisconsin Rapids won the right to enter the state tournament at Madison for the second straight year, by defeating Antigo in the finals 39-33. They had previously subdued an alert Greenwood five in the first round.

Bob Mader spearheaded the Raider's attack with 17 points. Ritchay and Wittrock supplied 7 points each, Passineau 3 field goals, and Marvin 2 points.

Fermanich, high scoring Antigo center, was held to 4 points by Wittrock in the latter's best defensive game of the year. Marvin and Ritchay were also outstanding on the defensive, Passineau enabled the Rapids to grab a greater share of the rebounds by repeatily outjumping his taller opponents from the North. Bob Mader played his usual brilliant game.

The Geography Club meetings from now until May will consist of talks and slides about the Wisconsin Dells and Baraboo regions. The club will make a field trip to this area later this spring.

The Rapids track squad has now definitely begun taking form in preparation for this year's clash. With the canvas coming off, the indoor track season has really begun and the field house has the familiar spring odor of moist cinders.

This year it bears the impressive title of the Thirteenth Annual Wisconsin Rapids Invitational Indoor Track Meet and was held on April 5. Visiting teams were LaCrosse Central, Madison West Stevens Point, Janesville, and last year's champions--Appleton.

In order to allow more schools to enter only two representatives from each school may be entered in each event. The scoring was run on a 5 4 3 2 1 basis with the relay counting 10, 6, 2, for first, second and third places.
