His hobbies are reading, hunting, fishing, and machine work.




Introducing to you, Miss Corinne Andreasson, freshman and sophomore English teacher.

RAIDERS WIN

The Raiders come through with another 35 - 0 win over visiting Rhinelander. Performing the two fundamentals that make football a great game, blocking and tackling, the Rapids did both well.

During the first quarter, Rhinelander intercepted a pass, and on the completion of one of their own, came down to the Rapids 6-yard line. In two plays, "Big Jim" and "Tory", who played an almost perfect game, moved the ball well out of danger and to a touchdown.

Tory ran around end, and with some very nice blocking, made a first down on Rhinelander's 44 yard line, but a penalty on the Raiders moved it back to the 49.

On the very first play of the second quarter, Big Jim flipped a beautiful 35-yard pass to Paul Johnson. Johnson snatched the ball while running at top speed and then raced over for a first touchdown. Mike Johnson's placement was blocked by Rhinelander's Savage.

The most sensational play of the game occurred when Tory picked out Rhinelander's punt, and with that effective blocking moved to the 10-yard line. On the fourth down, after Big Jim had plowed center twice and Mike jumped guard, Tory again ran around end for the second T.D. On Mike's placement, Rhinelander was off side. On Mike's second try he booted the ball squarely between the uprights making the score 13 - 0.

In the third period Rhinelander made two 1st downs, but was forced to punt. The ball went out of bounds in the end zone. In eleven plays the Raiders made another touchdown. The first five downs included steady driving. The touchdown came when Mike sliced off tackle from the one yard line. His try for the extra was blocked.

Dick Kuel, who was on that traditional ball, looked very gook. Tory intercepted a Hodag serial on our 45-yard line. Kuehl came into the game and cracked off tackle for 11 yards. The Raiders

then executed a swell reverse pass from Tory to Kuehl on the 5-yard line, and Kuehl ran over untouched for the fourth touchdown.

Tory gained 108 yards and 60 yards on return punt. Outstanding in the backfield were Reimer and Kuehl, while Paul Johnson, Brewster, Bob Schindler, Simonis, Gala, and Captain Zip Reinicke did a real job.

B-SQUAD

Lincoln High schools "B" squad spoiled Ports eleven man debut by capitalizing on a last minute fumble.

The first half was hard fought, and ended in a scoreless deadlock. The Kurzmen gave the "B" a terrific scare by scoring in the third quarter. They led until the final quarter.

Port's T. D. came after a sustained drive of 80 yards. Taking to the air, Port's Lunquist pitched a pass to Sigler. Arendt's dropkick was wide and the score remained 6 - 0.

Rapids received and lost the ball on downs on Port's 24 yard line. On the second play Toepel pounced on a fumble on Port's 27 yard line. LaBarge shot off tackle to the 21 yard line after which Anderson made the first down on Port's 15 yard line. La Barge and Fahrner brought the ball to Port's 6 yard line and another first down. Dave Henke almost made the touchdown, then Fahrner was stopped cold. The very next play tied up the game when LaBarge hit tackle for a touchdown. Fanning made the extra point.

Port fought hard the remainder of the game but Rapids held the ball until the final play.

Rapids had 14 first downs and Port 10.

Miss Schlough: It is exciting to be in a large school where Homecoming is made an event.

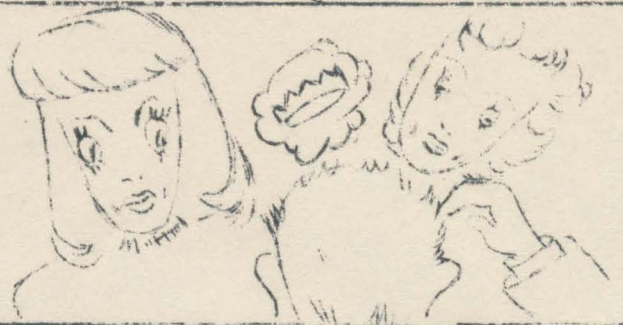
Mary La Vigne: I could hardly wait for it to come.

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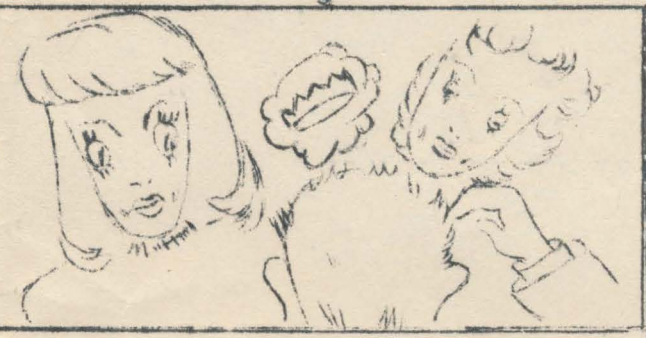
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
