While Madella Robins beat out a tune.

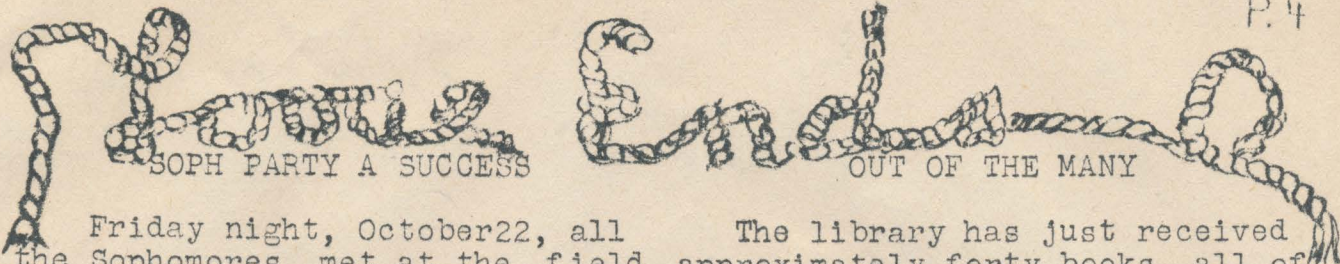
I saw Jack Peters run down the street,
