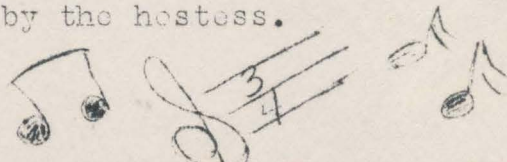
Monday night, October 2, the members of Gamma Sigma met at the home of Gloria Suchow, 921 16th Street North.

1932	Wisconsin Rapids, 33 Wausau, 0
1933	Wisconsin Rapids, 7 Point, 13
1931	Wisconsin Rapids, 6 Marshfield, 0
1944	Wisconsin Rapids, 25 Marshfield, 0
