A committee of Lincoln High students selected by the Student Council, recently consulted the manager, Mr. Anoska, of the Wisconsin and Falace theaters about statentprices. He kindly spent an hour explaining why a 55¢, or less, student price would be impossible. The main reason is the high tax. Mr. Anoska stated, "I will give you student prices, if you do just one thing-lower the tax on movies." The case is that of the 65¢ paid by a patron with about a 20% tax, ll¢ goes to the government and 54¢ stays at the theater. Even if there is a lower student price the tax is still figured on the highest price 65¢.
