tory.

RAIDERS WIN SECTIONAL: BEAT BONDUEL, AND RHINELANDER

The Red Raiders are preparing to 'eave for Madison! After a hectic 2 game stand on the Stevens Point floor, the team won the sectional tournement and are elegible to enter the statetoum-

ament at Madison.

Last Friday night, the Raiders played a terrific game, defeating a small Bonduel team by a secre of 67 to 47. Charles Gurtlerled the Raider scoring attack netting 19 points. The first tem played consistently until the third quarter, when Coach Phil Manders started to use his reserves. In the

consolation play off on Saturday night, Bonduel defeated Marathon

47-44.

Immediately following the Consolation game Saturday night, the Rod Raiders met a swift Rhinelander team. The Raider foes made an impressive start, with their big center, Jack Gilley making hook shots consistently. The Raid- ers started a very impressive scoring attack to overcome the Hodags in the second half and go on to victory. Doug Gill led the Raider scoring attack, accounting for 18 points.
