

FORENSIC SEASON ATTRACTS FINE NUMBER

A large group of L.H.S. students are spending much of their time preparing various speeches, orations, or declamations to help them acquire skills in the field of forensics.

The purpose of forensics is to help the student develop poise in front of an audience and the ability to think on his feet. The field of forensics may be divided into six parts: humorous and serious declamation, extemporaneous reading, original oratory, non original oratory and four minute speech.

A declamation is a dramatic characterization of a short selection which can be either humorous or serious in nature. There are 24 L.H.S. students preparing declamations. Two students are working on extemporaneous speeches which are 5 to 7 minute speeches concerning current events given after an hour's preparation. Extemporaneous reading has attracted 12 of our students. This branch of forensics consists of reading interpretively from a printed page for 5 minutes after an hour's preparation.

Original oratory, that is. a persuasive speech, is being studied by one student. Eight non original orators are also working on speeches.

The team will play the Merrill Bluejays here at Lincoln fieldhouse tonight at \$:15.

In the Marshfield game, the Rapids squad took an early lead which they kept throughout the entirety of the contest. Coach Phil Manders substituted frequently and the first team only played about 2/3 of the game.
