Actually received notice from MyChart several days after we had gotten our shots.

After she won State in 53, Bill Hoard suggested that his great dog Trigger and Patti produce a litter. Trigger was the 1949 state champion. A guy way up in Winnipeg named Cyril Hicks bought Duke for \$800 in March of 1954. Duke became the Canadian National Champion in 1959 and appears in the picture with Cy Hicks

The pictures of Bill Hoard's Trigger and Duke are from a book by Eloise Heller Cherry published in 1981 devoted to Chesapeakes. She offered my dad \$5,000 for Patti in 1954 at a field trial in California. My dad declined but offered me instead! The picture of Patti and others are from a montage in my office. They were taken with this old thing called a Kodak camera. Andy Devine was also at the field trial in California. He was an old drunk. Takes one to know one.
