# READY FOR 20 MORE

The Museum will mark 20 years of operation this summer and we have slated a grand opening celebration on Sunday, June 6, 1993, from 1:00 - 4:00 p.m. honored guests, the Wisconsin Society of Land Surveyors (WSLS) will be cutting the ribbon on a newly renovated presentation of the history of surveying. "Point of Beginning: Wisconsin", is a cooperative venture between the Land Surveyors and the SWCHC. Funding was provided for this project along with technical assistance from the WSLS Education Committee.

South Wood County has maintained a collection of surveying artifacts since 1980. Now after 13 years in the basement, the featured exhibit has been moved to the main floor. We are fortunate to have such an enthusiastic group participate in the presentation of local history. This one-of-a-kind exhibit and will serve as a model for similar undertakings throughout the state.

The Museum is also unveiling other items from our collections. The Laundry Room in the basement has been painted and rearranged. Look for the curtain stretchers complete with a pair of curtains! The Dairy items that once shared this location have been moved to an adjacent display area.

Would you like to test your identifying skills? The "What is it?" challenge, gives all an opportunity to guess the name of the artifact. We've searched for some easy examples and some difficult. Be prepared to be stumped.

The second floor will host a display of military uniforms and supporting paraphernalia. The Civil War, WWI and WWII are represented. Childrens' clothing has also been displayed this season. We've added a grouping of tiny shoes and some appropriate photos from our collections.

If you would like a "hands-on" introduction to some of the documents in our possession, we have set up a reference room for scrapbook gazing. There are special procedures to follow, white gloves are a must when handling the books, but volunteers will be happy to assist you in paging through these wonderful samples.

Have we whetted your appetite? Hope so! Visit the Museum this summer and discover the treasures that await. We will be open on Sundays and Tuesdays from 1:00 - 4:00 p.m.

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## **Port Auditorium**

It's now referred to as the old gym at the Port Edwards High School but when it was built, it was the Port Edwards Community Auditorium. When new in 1920, it boasted as having the second largest theatrical stage in the state of Wisconsin, second only to the Davidson Theater in Milwaukee.

Dedicated on August 18, 1920, the auditorium offered a gala dedication program for the more than seven hundred attendees. Even the balcony was filled in order to accommodate the crowd.

The asbestos fire curtain rose at 8:15 PM and then the red velvet curtains parted exposing a Italian lake setting scene. By means of the latest innovations in electrical theater lighting, the scene took on a twilight atmosphere with stars actually glittering in the sky portion of the scene.

Carl Rupp and his ten man symphony orchestra immediately presented an ovature and followed by other musical selections.

The program continued with singers, vaudeville acts, a magician, and a motion picture comedy as well as Pathe News of the Day.

A special feature of the evening was the filming of the guests as they arrived for the evening's performance and then showing the same movie at the end of the show. Quite a feat to film, develop and show the film all in the span of a few hours!

After two more stage settings, one a garden scene and the other depicting a villa home interior the audience departed to a

rousing exit march played by Rupp and Linden's Symphony Orchestra.

A newspaper account stated that the Community Auditorium is of brick, stone and steel construction. It is fireproof and electrically lit. It adjoins the Port Edwards school and is an integral part of the school's programs. A pair of carbon arc, 35mm movie projectors will project films from an overhead balcony at the rear ceiling of the hall.

And back stage on a second level mezzanine are three dressing rooms for the star performers. Over that, on a third level, is the tangle of ropes and catwalks for adjusting the scenery for the mamouth stage.

Although there is not an orchestra pit as such, the musicians have access form the basement to an area under the lip of the stage.

The Auditorium committee and the Port Edwards Recreation Club sponsored monthly movies, plays and shows, many of them brought from Chicago as part of the traveling Lycium Circuit.

Eventually, school activities, especially after 1932 when Port Edwards added a high school, took over use of the auditorium. And that is the function to which it serves today. However, the old hard wooden seats have been replaced by soft, upholstered chairs for today's performances.

The Wisconsin Rapids Daily Tribune praised the Port Edwards Auditorium by stating, "Port Edwards has set a pace that the Rapids will have to hump some to beat."
