Editor's note and restaurant review:

Well, Judy and I went out for fish in the Rapids last Friday night. Our first stop was the **Wild Horse Saloon** east of Kellner on WW. They didn't have many cars in the lot, so figured we'd be seated almost immediately. Wrong! Two-thirds of the tables were empty and they said there would be a 15 minute wait. There were enough people in the bar to fill up 1/2 of the empty tables so I can only conclude they wanted us to run up a bar tab. Wouldn't have minded doing that but some guys at the bar were smoking "lord knows what" that brought tears to our eyes (and I'm a smoker!). We couldn't handle the smoke and left.

Second stop was the **Rapids Roadhouse** on 54 just west of U. What a change from the Wild Horse! They said they had remodeled it back in 95, but it looked like it had just been done. One of the cleanest eating spots I've encountered!

Art prints on the wall and a fire in the fireplace lent to the family style seating arrangements. Service was great. We had the Friday night "broiled fish" special - \$7.95 for two pieces of fish, soup, salad bar, and choice of potato. The clam chowder was excellent and filled with potatoes, carrots and clams. Don't know if they could have rinsed the clams a bit better but there was quite a bit of sand in the soup. Salad bar was not all that good. Lettuce with the usual toppings but the dressings all tasted a bit "out of the ordinary" and not for the better. Avoid the "pink stuff" that had no name at the end of the dressings. Really bad!

Our entrees arrived and the fish was cooked to perfection, but the chef evidently sprinkled it with "butter flavor" and it tasted like Orville Redenbacher - not bad if you like that flavor! The baked potatoes were dry roasted without the usual aluminum foil and were very fluffly. However, the chef couldn't avoid sprinkling something on the outside of the potatoes before roasting and I have no idea what it was, but it didn't smell good or taste good - it didn't affect the interior of the potato, however. They had other "fish specials" that night but they were \$13.95 and I'm glad I didn't try them for fear of what the chef would have done to them. All in all, a nice place but if I go back I'll try the fried fish and french fries.
