Nancy Warner ... you are not wrong with your assessment of Edgewater. Unfortunately, my mother has required the need to be in a home since last April for complications post knee surgery. She was in another facility in Rapids, developed severe complications which nearly cost her a leg amputation. After that lengthy hospitalization we made the decison to move her to a different home and chose Edgewater. She has been there since June and is quite content. Yes, she would rather be home but until the leg prongs from her fused leg are removed and healed she will remain there. In hindsight, one major item I would check out in choosing a home would be their track record for citations. I would also walk the halls and see what residents are doing, what the staff is doing for the residents. My mother has been antsy since the the first day and the staff are wonderful at keeping her busy. I could give you numerous examples of their wonderful care to my mother and others in the facility. My sister-in-laws mother is also in the same facility at the other end of the building. Once they knew these 2 ladies were acquaintances they made sure they have dinner together and get the two together regularly to visit. Recently my mother had another surgery, resulting in a dx of intermuscular bladder cancer with a poor prognosis. Of course we did the COP referal (2 year wait) and now are encouraging her to stay where she is ...at Edgewater. The social worker met with mom and discussed the situation and told her she didn't have to make a decision right away but they would put her on a list for a private room right away. She presently has a private room but would move to the other wing if she was a permanent resident. ( NO it is not possible that my mother live with me...I have not lived with her since the age of 12 and really don't want to begin now...It would be the end of a marriage and possibly the beginning of a prison sentence for me!!) I did agree that she could come here for interim stay of 2 wks.I will take care of her needs and I also said we would do her grocery, house work and take care of bills and laundry and also volunteered the same services to another person in the COP program in exchange for someone to go in and take care of the medical needs that I can not provide my mother. My thought was this may free someone else up too to spread the services out...believe me a 2 year wait to a terminal patient does not make sense. However, what also does not make sense is the fact that the COP program is a contract to agency program and due to liability issues can not accept a volunteer. The long and short of it all is I would highly recommend Edgewater Nursing home...
