It was a baby grand, sitting in the center of the breakfast/appetizer dining area, and it digitally played background music. It was almost spooky, like part of a Disney haunted mansion experience.

The Assembly itself was quite exciting and spiritually uplifting with speakers and musicians from all over the world. There were about 8,000 women there. Huge displays gave information about such things as racism, human trafficking, immigration, recycling, and United Methodist schools and mission institutions. There were two-hour workshops going all day on a wide variety of topics. I helped lead one on making the Charter for Racial Justice relevant for local units (women's groups in each church). The overall theme was "Faith, Hope, Love in Action," and everything was geared toward solidifying and strengthening our personal faith, examining ways we can reach out to offer the hope Jesus gives, and practical ways we can share His love.
