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## **Chalet set for change to wing shop**

How do you like your chicken wings?

The owners of The Chalet restaurant, 3310 Eighth St. S., Wisconsin Rapids, will close the restaurant and change its image, marketing the wings with "chix."

The new place will be a sports bar and grill called Chix and Wings and is scheduled to open in a few months, according to signs posted on the building.

The owners, Jan and Mike Walker of Wisconsin Rapids, were part owners of the Chalet.

They bought the rest of the business from Gail and Steve McIntyre, Jan Walker said.

The Walkers did not return messages for further details on the new restaurant.

According to the city zoning department, the Walkers have not filed any permits for remodeling yet, but Jan Walker did confirm that remodeling will take place.

The business has potential based on the success of sports bars in Wisconsin Rapids, said Melissa Loken, Heart of Wisconsin Business & Economic Alliance business development specialist.

If this sports bar offers something a little different than the others, it can aim itself at a more specific sports-bar crowd, she said.

"That type of business fulfills a certain niche in town," Loken said.

Loken saw the banner in front of the building as she drove by the old Chalet on Friday and she is curious to see how the business works out.  
"It will be interesting to see," Loken said.

### **Theodore Roosevelt's ideas on Immigrants and being an AMERICAN in 1907.**

"In the first place, we should insist that if the immigrant who comes here in good faith becomes an American and assimilates himself to us, he shall be treated on an exact equality with everyone else, for it is an outrage to discriminate against any such man because of creed, or birthplace, or origin. But this is predicated upon the person's becoming in every facet an American, and nothing but an American...There can be no divided allegiance here. Any man who says he is an American, but something else also, isn't an American at all. We have room for but one flag, the American flag... We! have room for but one language here, and that is the English language... and we have room for but one sole loyalty and that is a loyalty to the American people."
