And we do want to talk about him or her. Our greatest fear is that people will forget our child ever existed. And for the parents who's children have died, if you can survive the death of your child, you can survive anything. I send my hug to you.

Come on classmates, what have you been up to? My life isn't spectacular but I'm having a blast, Even if I am almost 61????
