I got called to spend the summer of 2003 at the Neuro Unit of Syracuse University and Upstate Medical University (a division of the State University of New York). They chose me without talking to me.

Syracuse's economy had been going down hill for 30 years as industrial jobs left the area. Local and state government jobs declined for years. University Hill was Syracuse's fastest growing neighborhood due to the growth of Syracuse University and Upstate Medical University (a division of the State University of New York), as well as dozens of medical office complexes. Yet, Syracuse's economy has faced challenges of industries leaving.

Syracuse officially recognizes 26 neighborhoods in its boundaries. Some of these have neighborhoods and districts inside of them. In addition, Syracuse also owns and operates Syracuse Hancock International Airport, located on the territory of four towns north of the city. Syracuse's neighborhoods reflect the historically ethnic and multicultural population. Traditionally, Irish, Polish and Ukrainian Americans settled on its Westside; Jewish Americans on its eastside; German

and Italian Americans on the north side; and African-Americans on its southside .Language differences are still are present. Calls coming into my Unit frequently were in Polish.

Poverty and Urban Decay blighted the City. Though the University had a highly rated medical school and basketball team (Orange), the Nursing Department was not a good fit for me. In less than a week we agreed to part ways. Within three hours, I had a fellowship at Transplant Unit at Strong Memorial Hospital at the University of Rochester (New York). We moved our motorhome from Turning Stone Resort to Canandaigua on the Finger Lakes of New York with no plans to ever return to Syracuse, New York.
