I remember when Shirley's dad played in a band, they would play at Trails End bar out towards Adams on New Years Eve. We would go out there with her family and some of our friends and listen to them and dance. At midnight, the bar owner would bring out a huge mountain of raw hamburger with onions mixed in and put it on the pool table. After the fixins came out, the locals would devour that pile, along with several gallons of beer! I could never get myself to go near it, as the thought of eating it raw just repulsed me.

Fast forward 30 years and I'm working for Porsche Cars North America in Reno, NV. Several of my coworkers were German, and we frequented a German bar on Friday night after work.
